	The City was notified by TxDOT in September 2015 that it was chosen
	as one of the recipients of a 2015 Transportation Alternates Program

	The course of the Decime Trails Europeian project includes two trail
	The scope of the Boerne Trails Expansion project includes two trail extensions. The longest trail extension, 1.8 miles, begins at the City
	Park trail head and extends southward to Cibolo Creek with planned
	connections to Ranches of Creekside, Herff Ranch and Samuel V.
	Champion High School. The second trail extension, .2 miles, is the

	The estimated total for the project soft costs (engineering, grant
	administration, inspections/testing, natural/cultural resource surveys,

topographic surveys, flood studies, utility fees, easements (if any would be needed) totals \$455,500 for this project. In addition, the City is required to fund 20% of construction cost which estimates to \$591,316. This makes the estimated total cost for the City \$1,046,816. (See Attachment 3 – City of Boerne TAP Costs).

The maximum amount of 80% matching federal funds for project construction is \$2,365,266. Included in the total project cost is the TxDOT 15% administrative fee for direct and indirect costs.

Project Costs

The estimated project duration for permitting, design and construction is 28-30 months from start to finish. Consequently, this project will span three fiscal years. Permitting and design will take the first 12 months, the remainder for project bidding, construction and inspections.

The funding match by the City for this project is significant at \$1,046,816, however, this represents only 31% of the total project cost, meaning .69 cents of each dollar for this project would be federally funded. When we presented the concept of submitting for this grant on April 28, 2015, the Council approved a nomination submittal resolution. As part of that discussion, Jeff Thompson presented potential funding scenarios that included using funds from the QOL Reserve Fund and/or from General Fund Reserves which would then be replenished by new funding from the QOL Reserve. (See Attachment 4 – Proposed Funding Sources). Depending on the overall timing of the project, which will span several fiscal years, we may be able to fund directly from the QOL Reserve without using the General Fund.

To officially begin the project the City is required to enter into a Master Advance Funding Agreement (MAFA) and Local Project Advance Funding Agreement (LPAFA). The City currently is party to an existing MAFA with TxDOT. Therefore, if authorization for expenditure of funds is received for this project, the next step is the following agenda item, which is the execution of the LPAFA and payment of \$77,128 within 30 days of agreement execution to TxDOT for direct and indirect state project costs.
