Requested Action	CONSIDER RESOLUTION NO. 2022-R41; A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO ENTER INTO AND MANAGE A DELEGATE AGENCY AGREEMENT FOR FUNDING OF PUBLIC PURPOSE BETWEEN THE CITY OF BOERNE AND RAINBOW SENIOR CENTER. (Kronkosky Place)

Background Information	<p>Each year, the City of Boerne contracts to provide funds with certain non-profit entities that provide specific services to the local community. After the last fiscal years' agreements, staff looked to reassess the process by which these agreements were evaluated as well as to work to strategically align these requests for funds to specific goals and principles laid out in the documents in the Rolling Ten Year Plan as well as aligning to the City's Vision, Mission, and Values.</p> <p>The Kronkosky Place in Boerne (Rainbow Senior Center) is a 20,000 square foot facility that provides meeting, dining, exercise, card playing, dancing, kitchen and other services for adults 55 years and older. It has over 1,600 members and regularly serves daily meals to over 100 seniors and provides over 200 meals on wheels daily throughout Kendall County. Just through the first 3 quarters of Fiscal Year 22', Rainbow Senior Center and Golden Age Center in Comfort have served over 12,000 meals and another 44,000 additional meals have been served through the Meals-On-Wheels program. The Center also provides for transportation to seniors for various local errands. Over 3,700 trips have been provided just this year.</p> <p>The services provided and their outcomes align with Goal 4 of the 2018 Master Plan, which is to provide high-quality facilities and services which create a healthy, safe, and well-educated community as well as Goal 6 which addresses maintaining character through various community livability endeavors. This also aligns with the tenant of Service as laid out in the City's values which looks for improvement of our community and betterment of people's lives.</p> <p>Attached for reference are quarterly operation reports from the last fiscal year (Attachment A), as required by the previous delegate agency</p>
